## **Objective**

The course examines policy choices and development strategies adopted by selected Asian and Southeast Asian countries and the time frame for consideration is after Second World War until now. The course is mostly concerned with policies in education, infrastructure and urbanization, business and international competition, financial systems, government's efficiency and impartiality. Additionally, policy issues in industrialization and democratization conducive to one country's success or failure are also discussed. The course adopts a multi-perspective approach in analyzing policy choices and objectively compare nations under similar or different contexts.

After the course, students are expected to:

- Understand policy choices of some Asian countries given favorable and unfavorable factors.
- Develop comprehensive and deep insights in issues relevant to development or policy choices of these countries.
- Constructively criticize opportunities, challenges and choices of certain countries under different contexts and background.
- Comparatively discuss some critical policies to the transition of Vietnam from a centrally
  planned economy to market economy and from an agricultural and rural to an industrial
  and urban society.

### Requirements and Grading

- Diligent and active class participation and assignment completion are compulsory. Students are expected to read all required readings before class and be ready to participate in class discussions (the length of required readings is around 1000 words for each class meeting).
- **Policy memo**: There are <u>12 policy memos</u>. For each assignment, students must write a short analysis examining the general development process or a particular aspect deemed necessary by students. Word count for each memo, excluding tables with primary data, should be around 500-1000 words (as counted in Microsoft Word).
- **Group project**: Students will design a poster and a group presentation at the end of the course. The class is divided into 6 groups. Students decide their own presentation topics pertinent with topics covered in class and prepare their presentation with the consultation from instructors. Topics can be a policy issue of a chosen country constrated with other countries, particularly other eleven countries. Word count for the group project should not exceed 5000 words (as counted in Microsoft Word). The poster should neatly fit a A0 page with all information and data about that country.
- All assignments are due by 8:20 a.m. on the specified due date. Teaching team will grade
  and return the assignments to students within one week from the date of submission.
  Should there be any concerns regarding grading, students can discuss with teaching team
  members during appointments.
