Course Overview and Objectives:

Based on global development agendas suggested by international organizations such as World Bank and United Nations Development Programmes (UNDP), this course explores sources of economic growth, inequality, poverty, and other aspects of development. Even in today's globalized and technologically advanced world, more than eight hundred million people are still malnourished, more than one billion people live on less than a dollar per day. Poverty and inequality have proven to be stubbornly resilient against attempts to reduce them over the last decades. This course first examines various approaches and debates on the concept of development, varieties of development models, and so forth, drawing on economics, politics, sociology and public policy literature. It then explores key areas of debates on 1) urbanization and its consequences, 2) rural development, 3) education, 4) innovation and technological development, 5) public health and social care, and so forth. Throughout the course we will seek policy implications and lessons for Vietnam and other developing countries.

This course is built on lectures and students' contribution to class discussions and case studies. The objective of this course is for students to gain an overview of both issues and practices related to the study of development. Detailed course objectives are:

- Provide students with a clear understanding of key debates and issues on development.
- Help students formulate important development agenda and strategies for Vietnam
- Provide students proper comparative methods to strategically learn from the best practices.

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- Increase students' awareness of sustainable development goals (SDGs) and 'grand challenges' we face suggested by international society.
- Provide students with the analytical tools needed to make sense of economic development and social change.

Course Requirements:

To avoid possible misunderstanding, the course policies are stated here, even though some of policies are obvious. Students are expected to have read assigned materials and to have participated in discussions. Through the readings and class discussions students will recognize the opportunities and challenges, strengths and weaknesses for the country's development, and finally to give suggestions on appropriate improvements and renovations. Grades will be given based on class participation, weekly reading response paper, case presentation, and team research project.

- <u>Pre-Class Writing</u>: Reading materials will be distributed before class starts. Each student is required to write-up a maximum two-page long memo (MS-Word, 500 words limit, double-spaced) on the suggested topics below. Your paper will be graded based on <u>clear identification</u> of one of global or Vietnamese development problems. Also, <u>your motivation</u>, <u>evidence</u>, <u>estimated damage</u>, <u>potential solutions</u>, and so forth will be part of your final grade for this project. You are required to submit this assignment by Saturday, July 27th, 8.20 a.m. (Submit via MS-Team). Suggested paper topics are (It would be helpful, if you read the session topics below):
 - 1. Capitalism, marketization, and increasing inequality in Vietnam,
 - 2. Problems of higher education in Vietnam,
 - 3. Danger of climate change (environment) in Vietnam,
 - 4. Urban and rural gap in Vietnam,
 - 5. Or other development problems you think important.
- <u>Class Participation</u>: This component is not simply checking your attendance. Your visibility and active contribution to the class discussions will be evaluated (e.g. raising important issues or asking critical questions, responding to instructor's questions

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faithfully, discussing with classmates, etc.). In addition, doing similar activities online will be counted as class participation.

- <u>Press-Conference Project</u>: Holding a press-conference is a simple, effective way to communicate your message with mass media and can generate news about your causes and awareness about your project. Each group will play a role as spokesmen and audience (other classmates) will communicate with the group as reporters. A group will hold a press-conference on their Wikipedia topic and the other two groups will play a role as reporters. Maximum presentation is 10 minutes and Q&A is also 12 minutes sharp. ***You (both presenters and audience) are required to be concise, evidence-based Allocated time slots for this project are **Session 9-16**.
- Wikipedia Project: It is often believed that Wikipedia is a web-based place where rumor and misinformation are spread. But, many Wikipedia articles are accurate like a regular encyclopedia and inaccurate information is quickly corrected by online users. Developing Wikipedia articles let you not only become content creators but also have a real impact on your world. Your work will inform others, as many people go Wikipedia to get initial information on a topic. Wikipedia also has an editing role: "everything must be cited." Students are required to work as a group, present at press-conference, get Q&A, and write up a Wikipedia style article. A detailed guideline will be provided (last page of this syllabus). You are required to submit Wikipedia paper (in Vietnamese) by August 5, 8.20 a.m.
- <u>Final Paper</u>: Based on your understanding in dealing with challenges in development in class, you are required to write <u>a final paper</u> on broadly defined development issues in Vietnam or other countries (comparison is also welcome). You are required to explore a specific development policy problem. Maximum is <u>2,000 words</u> (except references). Deadline is **August 19**th, **Monday 8.20 a.m. sharp**.

You are advised to choose one of the development policy areas we studied in class as follows but not limited to:

I. Press-Conference


- o Choose a topic that is relevant to session topics and can be convert into Wikipedia paper.
- Press-Conference will be done from Session 9 to Session 16. It would be great if we have one group per one session, but Session 10, 12, 14, 16 can have maximum 2 groups.
- Within the scope of the sessional topics (urban problems, rural development, education, science & technology, public health & social care, and environmental problems), each group is required to choose a popular, important, and interesting topic that is worth gaining public attention (what kind of topics are on Wikipedia?).
- Presenting group is supposed to provide very concise and clear information about what your topic is, when it happened, how it has been developed, how it ha been handled by

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the government authority (or relevant actors) – Just fact-based. Then audience group (assuming reporters) will be allowed to ask questions.
